

Palm Sunday Reflection

Humility. So many of the holy men and women throughout the history of Christianity speak of the importance of humility in the spiritual life.

The humble person realizes their dependence on God for all things. The humble person knows that all that they have received is pure gift, even their own talents, and so they freely spend themselves on others around them. I wish I could say that this humble person that I am describing is myself, but if I am honest, I know that so often this is not the case. Why? Because one of the ways in which we grow in humility is *humiliation*, and humiliation is something that all of us so often seek to avoid at all costs.

Humility. Our second reading today from Paul's letter to the Philippians so beautiful speaks to all that is happening here on Palm Sunday: "...He humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross." Christ's Passion in Jerusalem was filled with *humiliation* and He could avoided it, but chose rather to embrace it. For the sins of us all, He fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah: "I gave my back to those who beat me, my cheeks to those who plucked my beard; my face I did not shield from buffets and spitting."

Saint Mother Teresa speaks of the Gospel of the "Five Fingers": You. Did. It. For. Me. All of the pains and humiliations that Jesus suffered during Holy Week, He did for each one of us. He embraced these humiliations knowing our past, our present, and our future, and knowing how we will at some point disappoint Him again. But knowing all of this, Jesus would do it all over again for each of us tomorrow.

Humility. My challenge for us this week is two-fold. First, is there a place in our lives where we have experienced humiliation? Can we start to see that humiliation as part of God's plan and allow Him to bring new life from that? Second, what is holding us back from simply receiving God's love? Often times we are good at loving others, but not very good at loving ourselves. Jesus embraced these humiliations *for each of us*. A blessed Holy Week to you and may we all get just a little bit better at accepting these humiliations like Jesus did, so that we may grow just a little bit in humility.
