### First Reading: Joel 2:12-18

### **Reflection:**

It's tradition, every Ash Wednesday we hear these sacred scriptures. This day always reminds me of my grandmother, and her large ceramic bowl. Early in the morning, she



would prepare our one meal, a simple tuna noodle salad, with great love. As a family we attended mass, received our ashes, and went our separate ways. We eventually returned home to share this simple meal, and talked about what we would give up. But, my grandma would always encourage us to pray more, and to reach out: help out the elderly neighbor, keep our room clean, offer to do extra chores and talk nicer to each other. All with a smile. No gloomy faces.

My grandma was a breath of fresh air, she never missed a moment to encourage her family to witness God's grace.

That is why I usually feel a sense of freshness when Lent arrives. It's like a window inside me is being opened so the wind can come seeping into the house and clean out the stale air. It is another opportunity to be intent on receiving God's grace.

I envision God's grace as being a generous, energizing movement of total goodness. The Holy Spirit! This stream of love is always available to each one of us. It is free and it is powerful. Grace can change our lives. All that we need do is be open to receiving it and attentive to goodness (Holy Spirit) in our daily lives. This Lent, let us pause each morning when we rise, stretch our arms wide and pray:

> God of love, I open myself to you. May I be aware of your powerful goodness, Given to me at every moment of this day. May all I am and all I do bless others today.
